## ***Walking in Liverpool this month.***

Liverpool owes its existence to the natural brine springs around Onondaga Lake, which drew the first settlers to the area in the late 18th century. Boiling brine to make salt was worth the work and hardship; salt was so valuable it was called "white gold". In the 1820s, Liverpool was home to workers on the state's canal system, many of them Irish, and the community was called "Little Ireland" for a time. The Oswego Canal opened in 1828, connecting the Erie Canal in downtown Syracuse with the port of Oswego on Lake Ontario. The Oswego Canal ran along the lakeshore just below Liverpool's First Street and became the lifeblood of the settlement.

The Village was incorporated in 1830. It is said that the name "Liverpool" was chosen for the great port in Liverpool, England, and locally was famous for shipping high-quality salt. Salt barrels stamped "Liverpool" were known to contain a dependable product. Did Liverpool settlers choose the name to honor the English city, or as a marketing ploy?

German immigrants to the area in the early 1850s came to work in the salt industry. Some brought the willow weaving craft with them. John Fischer is said to be the first Liverpool willow weaver. As interrelated families and friends joined him in Liverpool, and as the salt industry waned, willow basket weaving became the main

occupation of many residents. You can still see some willow workshops in Liverpool's backyards, many converted to garages today. The Liverpool Willow Museum is the Hurst family workshop, moved to its present site at 314 Second Street to preserve and commemorate this part of Liverpool history. Enjoy your walk.

The "15 minutes of Fame" will be given by Dorianne Gutierrez of the Historical Assn. at 9:45 on Saturday morning.

**Directions:** From north-south on routes 370 or 57 to Liverpool, turn right on Tulip Street. From east and south-north on Rt. 81 to Liverpool exit. Take Liverpool Parkway exit to Liverpool. Bear left at 2nd st. (route 370). Library is on the left at the corner of Tulip St.

Note: Parking is available on the street – some under the Library and also down the street by the Retreat restaurant. Be sure to stop at the Willow Museum on 2nd St. & the Salt Museum in the Park.



### ***Update on CNY Folksmarch***
